Uinta-Wasatch-Cache National Forests go to <http://www.fs.usda.gov/uwcnf> see the other related links on the Forest web page. Click on the National Forest **Visitor's Guides**, at the top right hand side of web page to find information about other forests in Utah, Idaho, Wyoming and Nevada. Click on **Recreation** to find out about many of the activities that occur on the Forest. Access **Maps and Publications** for a black and white **Motor Vehicle Use Maps** (MVUM) that display roads and trails that are open to public motor vehicle use. **MVUM** maps display seasonal and special vehicle designations and possible dispersed camping (**car camping**) areas across the Forest by District. The Avenza Maps Mobile App <http://www.avenza.com/pdf-maps> or other geospatial pdf-map software have **MVUM** maps for free and so you can see where you are at in real time.

The Uinta-Wasatch-Cache National Forests manages nine **Wilderness areas**. To find out more about the management of these areas and other Wilderness areas within the U.S. go to <http://www.wilderness.net/>. There are maps and other helpful information about Wilderness areas within the U.S.

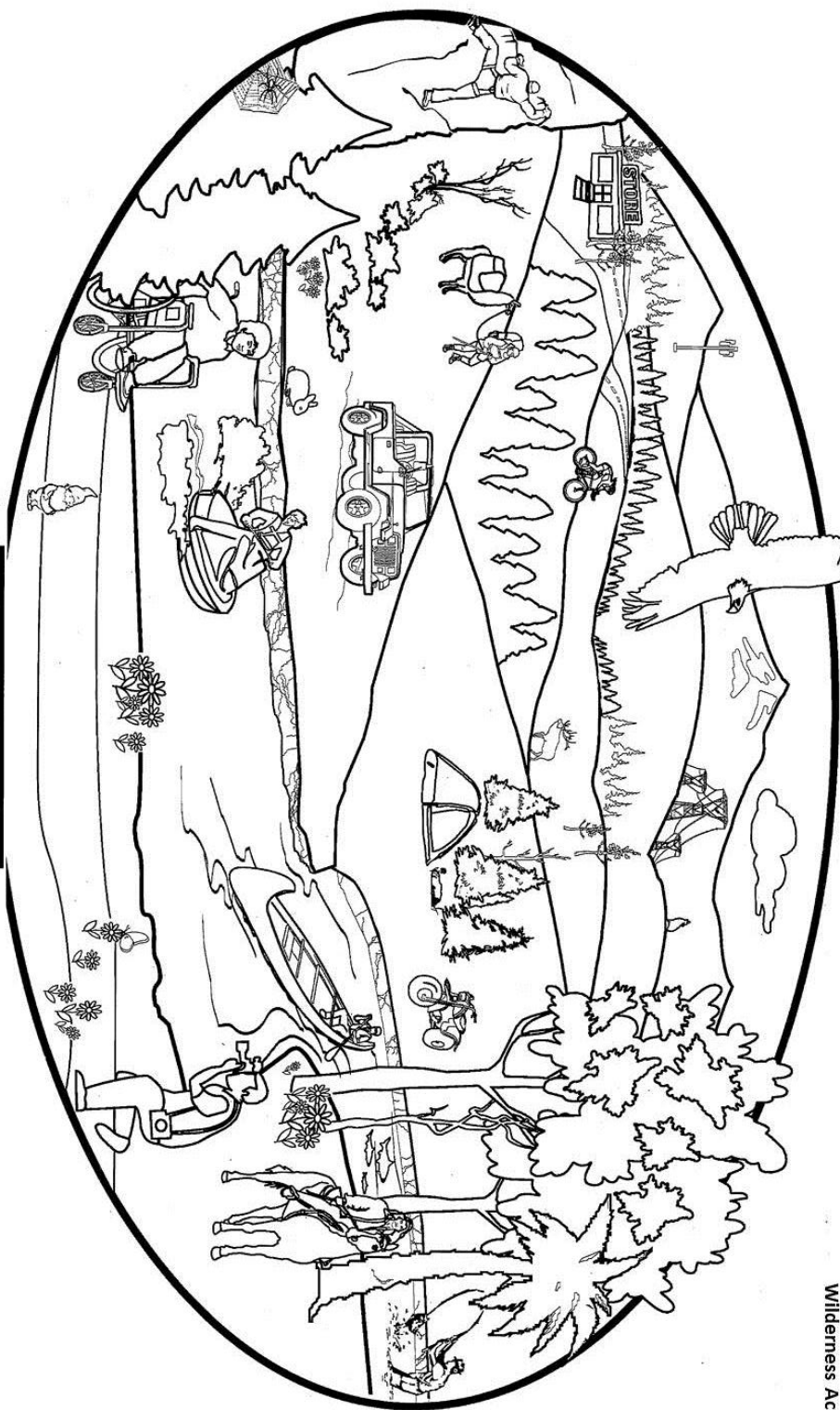
